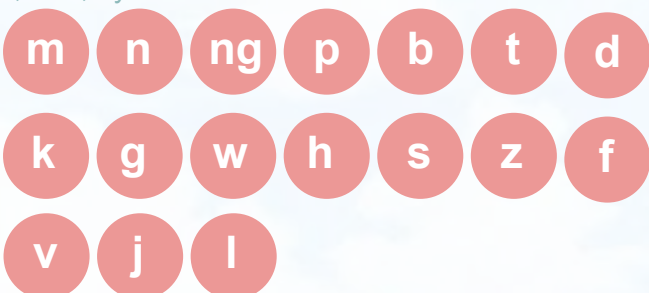

90% of children will be able to make these sounds by the age listed below:

3;0 - 3;5 years



3;6 - 3;11 years



4;0 - 4;11 years



dg - as in 'giraffe'
zh - as in 'measure'

5;0 - 5;11 years



6;0 - 6;11 years



7;0 + years

What can you do to help?

- Model correct speech for your child, eg. If they say "look at wed dod", you can say "yes, look at the red dog"
- Look at your child when you talking together
- Let your child watch your face, lips and tongue as you form sounds and words
- Repeat new words and sounds over and over, and use them often in your conversation
- Praise your child when sounds are correct, especially if the sounds were previously difficult for them
